Director added that there is also proposal for establishment of Centre for Service Standards in</p>	<p>Director informed that a Disciplinary Committee, which was approved to be formed in the meeting of Executive Council of 30 August 2019, has been constituted with the approval of the Chairman under the Chairmanship of the Director consisting of Prof. K.K. Pandey, Prof. C. Sheela Reddy and Registrar.</p> <p>Director also informed that as decided in the previous E.C. meeting of 30th August 2019, for seeking voluntary contribution from members of IIPA, IIPA has received very good response in this regard and till date 75 members contributed Rs 2.18 Lakhs. E.C. appreciated and thanked the members of IIPA who contributed for the cause.</p> <p>Regarding the Branches meeting, the attendance of Chairmen of the Branches was discussed. The Chairman suggested that in case the Chairman of the Branch is physically incapacitated or has a very valid reason for absentee, he or she may nominate some high ranking Branch office bearer like Vice Chairman or Secretary to attend the meeting but not below that. Also this should be an exception rather than a norm.</p> <p>The Centre of Excellence for Tribal Studies has been fully functional at IIPA now. In addition IIPA has been trying to establish centres with the support of other ministries also. IIPA has submitted proposals for establishment of centres in the field of drinking water and sanitation, fisheries studies and women empowerment.</p>

Misra, Chairman, Odisha Regional Branch said that the active membership in every branch has gone down and new members are not being admitted. If new members are admitted then more people will be encouraged to participate in various competitions and activities of IIPA and branches. Chairman informed that due to legal matters, the life membership has been stopped for now. But IIPA is conferring Associate Members to those who are applying. He also informed that these essay competitions are not limited to members only but open to all. Director added that after the resolve of the legal matters, the Associate Members may be converted to Life Members if they request for the same and fulfill the eligibility conditions but the process will be as per the rules of the Institute and shall not be automatic. Director also added that the Associate Members enjoy the rights to access the library of the institute and participate in programmes of IIPA but not entitled to subsidized rates in the hostel.</p>	<p>Action taken already provided by the Director.</p>

<p>Item No.313.8 A brief report on the important activities of the Institute during September-October, 2019 relating to Training Programmes and Status of Research Projects.</p> <p>Noted.</p> <p>Shri S.S. Kshatriya, Chairman, Maharashtra Regional Branch said that in the list of training programme, IIPA conducted training of the newly inducted Joint Secretaries to Government of India from the private sector and Shri Kashtriya wanted to know about the experience of IIPA while imparting training to them. Director replied that it was a wonderful experience. IIPA trained the 08 participants recruited by the Government. The participants had vast experience in their respective fields of aerospace, IT, energy and environment and climate change etc. Director also informed the EC that IIPA has got the privilege to sign the MoU with International Solar Alliance (ISA) on 21 October 2019. The first half of the programme will held at the residence of Hon. Vice President of India and the second half will be held at IIPA. The IIPA-ISA alliance is likely to conduct around 100 training programmes. The International Solar Alliance is headquartered in India (Gurgram) and Director added that it is on the focus and priority of Hon. Prime Minister of India, Shri Narendra Modi ji.</p>	<p>Action taken already provided by Director.</p>

<p>Shri Shekhar Dutt, Vice President said that now a days, bright pass-outs from IIT, IIMs are not opting for jobs in Government or Corporate sector. They are more inclined to start their own ventures or join professional development non-governmental organizations. IIPA should try to reach out these bright pass-outs and provide appropriate training to them. In Israel, every day hundreds of start-ups are established and Government is encouraging them. In India, MSME Development Institute (MSME-DI), Okhla is working to train the young professionals for start-ups. So, IIPA should also work in this direction. Chairman said that it is good idea but it will be difficult for IIPA to identify those bright pass-outs and train them. The Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises through their training institutes are more equipped to provide this training.</p> <p>In regard to MSME, Prof. K.K. Pandey informed the EC that IIPA is working with MSME and MSME-DI for the formulation of first MSME policy of India. The Ministry has bestowed this task to IIPA. The EC members appreciated this achievement of IIPA. Director added that regional and local branches can play a great role in formulation of National MSME Policy by IIPA.</p>	<p>Action taken already provided by Prof. K.K. Pandey and Director.</p>
<p>Item No.313.9 Revised Budget Estimates for 2019-20 and Budget Estimates for 2020-21.</p> <p>While discussing the financials of IIPA, Chairman informed that IIPA tried to get more funds form DoPT and Finance Ministry earlier but didn't get favorable response due to various issues. But IIPA is working towards generation of more revenue through its training and research work. Shri Shekhar Dutt, Vice President added that there are scope to earn more from training programme as the Government is putting special focus on training and capacity building. Director informed that now a days training and research work are mainly</p>	<p>The inputs have already been provided by the Director. It is informed that the face to face training has come to standstill now due to Covid 19 pandemic. However IIPA has been trying to reorient and establish itself in the field of digital/online training. During the lockdown also, IIPA had been working and prepared digital content for online training. The 46th APPPA course has also started in online mode on 1st July 2020. IIPA has been imparting online training now to other organizations also like NADP, NACIN, MES etc.</p>

acquired through bidding process and there is tough competition among different institutions. The policy of the Government is that all the training institutes should become self-sufficient. Director briefed that there are 353 national level training institutes working under 56 different Ministries of Government of India but imparting training to less than 1% of the employees. Many cadres of Central Civil Services do not have even the foundation courses. The Government is seriously working towards associating knowledge partners from outside and NILARD (under NITI Aayog) has initiated such process reportedly. As such, we have to work hard and seriously to stay relevant.

The Director further added that there are two dozen services which have no provision of organized Foundation Training Programme. Training is periodically imparted to only All India Service (AIS) officers and few Central Civil Services. Shri Shekhar Dutt, Vice President said that there is need to give more emphasis on the training and capacity building of the Government officials. India need to learn from Singapore in this regard, where Government officials are trained in best institutions of the world like Harvard University, Stanford University etc. Chairman said that NITI Aayog needs to take a call in this regard and should advice the Government to make more emphasis on training and capacity building. Shri Neeraj Singhal, Director - Representing C.E.O., NITI Aayog said that the Aayog is preparing Vision Document for India and he will place these suggestions of E.C. to the Aayog.

The Chairman informed that the Institute is organizing faculty conclave on 09 November 2019 and on 10 November 2019, the faculty will give presentations before a committee of IIPA. Chairman advised that the CEO of NITI Aayog should be invited on 10 November 2019 in the valedictory session. Director said that the CEO will be invited for the occasion.

The Faculty presentations were conducted on 09 and 10 November 2019 at IIPA.

<p>Shri S.C. Misra enquired about the long term liability of IIPA. The Director informed that the long term liability consisted of the retirement benefits like pension, gratuity, leave encashment etc. of the employees of IIPA. Shri S.S. Kshatriya enquired whether Government can be requested for a one time grant to settle this. The Director informed that the Government is not likely entertain this. Shri Kshatriya informed the E.C. about the revival of YASHADA, Pune, the State training academy of Maharashtra. He informed that it was fully dependent on Government earlier but the Government told it to be self sufficient. Now YASHADA is fully self sufficient. IIPA can study the revival model of YASHADA and learn something out of it.</p> <p>With these observations, the Executive Council approved the Revised Budget Estimates for 2019-20 and Budget Estimates for 2020-21.</p>	<p>IIPA has been trying to be self-sufficient. It has undertaken a large number of training programmes and research studies from which it is generating around 55% of its receipts. Recently, the IIPA Annexe Building has also been rented out on long-term lease basis to Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Govt. of India for establishment of National Tribal Research Institute (NTRI). From this also a substantial receipt per year will be generated, through which IIPA is planning to establish a Sinking Fund for its rainy days.</p> <p>However, the model of YASHADA revival will also be studied after the COVID 19 pandemic is over and travel restrictions are eased up.</p> <p>Revised Budget Estimates for 2018-19 and Budget Estimates for 2019-2020 as approved have since been submitted to the Department of Personnel & Training (DoPT).</p>

<p>Item No.313.12 Items to Report:</p> <p>(i) Appointment/joining.</p> <p>Ratified.</p> <p>(ii) Resignation of Dr. Anupam Sarkar, Assistant Professor of Applied Economics.</p> <p>Noted. The Chairman advised to recruit some good quality faculty at IIPA. The Director conveyed that it will be processed and we will recruit some good quality faculty on contract basis shortly.</p> <p>At the end of the meeting, Director explained the status of the campus re-development plan of IIPA which was desired to be informed by Prof. Lokendra Singh, Chairman of Manipur Regional Branch. Director informed that NBCC will implement the project and initially NBCC estimated that Rs.450 crore will be the expenditure and this amount will be recovered through leasing the buildings constructed on unused portion of land for 30 years. But as per the current situation of the market, the NBCC is now of the view that the amount will be recovered in around 50-60 years. Presently, NBCC has no CMD and soon the new CMD will join. Director informed that he will take-up this matter with the new CMD of NBCC. Director also informed that for this re-development project, various approvals from different Government departments and offices are required and IIPA is working towards getting</p>	<p>Due to Covid-19 pandemic, the academic activities of IIPA have been subdued now a days. The Grants-in-Aid from the Govt. has also been reduced. As such, it is not viable to recruit permanent faculty presently. IIPA has come out with a rolling advertisement for the recruitment of Adjunct/Visiting faculty (enclosed). IIPA hopes to get some good and experienced faculty in this way who may be able to develop good quality training modules for the long term benefit of IIPA.</p> <p>Due to Covid-19 pandemic, almost all the economic activities have gone down. The revenue expected from the redevelopment has also not been so rewarding for long term sustenance of Institute. However, as a blessing in disguise, the Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Govt. of India expressed its desire to establish an apex level National Training Institute in the field of Tribal Affairs, National Tribal Research Institute (NTRI) in the vacant IIPA Annexe premises. As such, IIPA has signed an agreement with MOTA and handed over the premises wef 1st September 2020. The rate offered by MOTA had been much more than the prevailing CPWD rate at which the NIDM was given the premises on rent earlier which was around Rs.60/- per Sq. Ft. whereas the Ministry has taken the premises at Rs.137/- per Sq. Ft. Moreover, the 15% amount given to the L&DO as also the Maintenance charges and taxes are extra. In this way, it has been a highly beneficial deal for IIPA. Since IIPA does not have a Sinking Fund (Reserve), it is also</p>

<p>these approvals.</p>	<p>proposed that the basic amount (after all L&DO, Maintenance, taxes etc.) may be accrued in the following manner:</p> <p>85% to be credited to a new Sinking Fund (reserve) for emergency usage in case of any Rainy Days</p> <p>05% to be credited to IIPA Research Endowment Fund for promoting internal suo-moto research</p> <p>10% to be credited to IIPA main Receipt and Payment account to be used as Income.</p> <p>However, the Training programmes are badly hit this year and the internal revenue of IIPA is going to be hit severely in this Financial Year. On top of it, Govt. has also cut down on already sanctioned grants to IIPA. As such, IIPA may use this rental amount in FY 2020-21 for its internal revenue as per requirement considering the year 2020-21 as Rainy Days. The Sinking fund and other divisions may be started from FY 2021-22.</p>
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Minutes of the 314th Meeting of the Executive Council	Action Taken
<p>Item No.314.2 Election of the Chairman of the Institute under Rule 9 of the Rules of the Institute.</p> <p>Shri T.N. Chaturvedi thanked all the E.C. members, the Institute and every one for reposing faith in him as Chairman, IIPA. He conveyed that many a time the thought of leaving the position of Chairman came to his mind but he did not leave as he did not want to leave IIPA in lurch. There are legal matters pending as also the DoPT Committee report is pending with the Government. For the institution to succeed the training, research, publication and other academic activities should be strengthened and academic matters need to be separated from the societal issues. The Institute has a very huge legacy and stalwarts like Shri H.M. Patel, Shri Ashok Mehta, Shri C. Subramaniam, Dr. A.N. Jha and Shri P.C. Alexander have been the E.C. members earlier. In recent times, there has been a degeneration in the quality of members and the members are now more interested in availing hostel facilities and freebies than academics and public administration. The Director also comes under great pressure from the members. As such, there is a need to separate the societal issues from academics. He further added that he has no intention to continue now and some worthy person should take over.</p> <p>However, all the members persuaded Shri T.N. Chaturvedi to continue as Chairman, IIPA. Prof. K.K. Pandey proposed the name of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi for Chairmanship. Shri Shekhar Dutt, Shri S.S. Kshatriya and Prof. N. Lokendra Singh seconded the name of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi for Chairmanship.</p> <p>Shri T.N. Chaturvedi explained to the members that there was no moral pressure on the members to elect him or anybody else for the post of the Chairman. As such the members are free to elect the Chairman as</p>	<p>No action required.</p>

per their conscience.

The Director asked for any other name for Chairmanship but there was no other name for the Chairmanship. The Director asked the Government representative also and they conveyed their consent for Shri T.N. Chaturvedi to continue as Chairman, IIPA.

The Director conveyed that Shri T.N. Chaturvedi has such a towering personality. He has been the CAG, Member of Parliament and Governor. Even in the present Government every one respects Shri T.N. Chaturvedi. Prof. K.K. Pandey consented and conveyed that the integrity which is associated with Shri T.N. Chaturvedi is phenomenal and his guidance is required by IIPA in future also. Shri Shekhar Dutt has conveyed that the Institute will march ahead in 21st century under the able leadership of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi as he has been associated with IIPA from its formative years. Prof. Lokendra Singh conveyed that Shri T.N. Chaturvedi must continue as Chairman in view of the present challenges and hurdles. Shri S.S. Kshatriya conveyed that it is very easy to destroy the institution but very tough to build the institution and Shri T.N. Chaturvedi is the ideal figure to build the institution and IIPA.

The Executive Council unanimously elected Shri T.N. Chaturvedi as Chairman for the two year term i.e. upto the date of AGM of 2021.

Shri Chaturvedi thanked all the members for expressing faith in him. The Chairman in the same vein informed that the members that he would continue to work for betterment and upliftment of IIPA tirelessly.

<p>Item No.315.1 To condole the sudden demise of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi, Chairman IIPA and follow up action.</p> <p>At the outset, the Executive Council condole the sudden demise of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi, Chairman IIPA on 5th January, 2020 and observed two minutes silence to pay homage to the departed soul.</p> <p>Shri Shekhar Dutt paid a warm tribute to Late Shri T.N. Chaturvedi and remembered as great erudite who excelled in every field of his life. Shri Amitabh Kant, Dr. C. Chandramouli and other members also shared their exchanges and communication with Shri T.N. Chaturvedi and remembered him.</p> <p>On behalf of the faculty and staff of IIPA, Shri S.N. Tripathi, Director paid glowing tribute to Late Shri T.N. Chaturvedi and informed that IIPA will try to fulfill the dreams and vision of Shri Chaturvedi. The Director also conveyed that IIPA is planning to hold Shri T.N. Chaturvedi Memorial special lecture series regularly henceforth. He also conveyed that the renovated Auditorium of IIPA may be named as Shri T.N. Chaturvedi Auditorium if the Members consent. All the Members unanimously supported the idea and approved it.</p> <p>In order to fill the casual vacancy of Chairman, which arose due to the sudden demise of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi, Shri Amitabh Kant, CEO Niti Aayog conveyed that it is a tough and transition time for IIPA and it would be in the fitness of the things if IIPA sticks with the DoPT. He proposed the name of Dr. C. Chandramouli, Secretary (Personnel), DoPT for filling up the casual vacancy of Chairman IIPA as interim measure which was seconded by Prof. K.K. 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Item No.316.3 Dates for the Annual Meeting of the General Body and Members' Annual Conference.

Under Rule 19 of the Rules of the Institute, the Annual Meeting of the General Body is to be convened in the month of September or October every year.

Rule 19 of the Rules of the Institute provides as under:

“The Annual General Meeting of the General Body shall be called by the Chairman of the Institute with the consent of the President of the Institute in the month of September or October every year after giving at least twenty one days’ notice of the date, time, place and the general nature of business to be discussed at such meeting....”

During the last AGM held on 18th October, 2019, Hon’ble Vice President of India and President IIPA desired that a statue of Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel may be installed in IIPA similar to the statue of the Mahatma Gandhi which is installed in office premises. IIPA is already in the process of preparing a bronze statue of Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel which will be installed in the centre of the IIPA library. If the expenditure has been incurred, mention should have been there whether the money has gone directly to their pocket or it has been routed through the IIPA.</p>	<p>The end of tenure of Director as well as the appointment is mentioned in the Annual Report under Administrative Matters. No where the full terms and conditions of appointment of the Director is mentioned in the Annual Reports. The Hon'ble Member may check the Annual Reports of similar organizations in this regard.</p> <p>The Annual Report of any organization is not the Memorandum of Association of the organization. It reflects the present facts and figures of the organization for the preceding year. The Annual Report of IIPA is one of the most comprehensive document pertaining to the whole academic activities of the IIPA like training, research, publications, faculty contributions, important events, important visitors, comprehensive annual accounts etc. The Hon'ble Member may check Annual Reports of similar organizations and he would find that IIPA's Annual Report is one of the best in this regard. The Hon'ble Member may also like to dwell upon the fact that IIPA is not a Company under Section 25 and it is a Society. So, its Annual Report can not be compared with the Annual Report of a Company.</p> <p>The foreign visit by Faculty members are only for academic purposes like attending Seminars, Conferences, Training etc. and with due permission of IIPA. Since external sponsoring agencies sponsor these visits, the funding can not be routed through IIPA but the expenses like to and fro travel, accommodation etc. are directly incurred by the sponsoring agencies and these do not go to the pockets of the IIPA Faculty.</p>
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	<p>The audit report is on plain paper. There is no address of the auditors. Actually, it should have been displayed over here that this is original and we can see it. But it has not been shown when the auditor has signed, when they have put their seal; it is just blank. So, it is not a proof. There are so many frauds which are going like this. People put the balance like this which is not signed.</p> <p>Then I come to page 132. Well, I do not want that a member should come here just for pleasure. But if a member comes for a very urgent purpose, then that should be considered. For example, I came here for knee replacement. I came here and stayed in the hostel, and for that period, I had to pay nearly Rs. 2.00 lakh as rent. I did not object to it. When we feel that IIPA is ours, you also feel that your members are also yours. So, this needs to be considered in a very compassionate manner and I hope you will do it.</p> <p>The other point is about your maintenance grant. You come to page 119. It says that maintenance grant was not given in the year 2018-19. If at all we are going to reconstruct the whole building, then why we are going to spend on refurnishing. So, if maintenance grant comes from the Centre and has to be spent, then why in one particular year that maintenance grant did not come? You have to give the reason for that. If it has come, then why it has not been accounted for?</p>	<p>days, in case of any emergency, they can extend their stay for another 5 days on double the rate with due approval of the Director and if there is availability in the hostel. The members should understand that IIPA is an academic institution and gets only around 45% grant from the government for its survival. It has to raise around 55% of resources through training and research. For this, IIPA has to conduct a large number of training programmes where it has to provide hostel accommodation also to its trainee officers. The government also is now in no mood to extend freebies to the autonomous institutions and many of the institutions are on verge of closure. IIPA is facing similar issues and it must raise resources for its sheer survival. Members must understand that IIPA can provide facilities to them only if it survives. Wiping out a deficit of Rs.50.79 lakh from the annual accounts for the year 2018-19 is a good performance in preparing the financial statement.</p> <p>It is pleasing to note that the Institute has implemented the Seventh Central Pay Commission's recommendations and paid the revised emoluments to its employees and pensioners. It is reported that the Institute has funded 30 per cent of the total expenditure. The source of funding is solicited. The problem of recurring expenditure on payment of retirement benefits, such as, pension, gratuity, leave encashment etc. should be addressed forthwith by approaching the Government of India for award of further grants by explaining the huge liability of Rs.97.76 lakhs in 2018-19.</p> <p>Discrepancies of Rs.114 lakh between gross value of fixed assets and assets physically owned, were reported during the financial years 2016-17, 2017-18 and the present financial year 2018-19, but so far, the reconciliation work has not been done. The committee constituted by the Institute is taking a long time in updating the fixed assets register. The period given to the committee for completion of this assignment may please be furnished. Please see pages 116 and 142 of the Annual Report for 2018-19 and pages 114, 115 and 138 of the Annual Report of 2017-18.</p> <p>The recovery of rent to the tune of Rs.2.17 crore from NIDM (20 per cent) has become a perennial problem for the Institute. The members of this august body would like to know why the Institute is not able to recover the rent due over the years. Why the normal rental act and rules are not applicable to the NIDM? It is suggested that a high level committee may be constituted to study this issue. Please</p>	<p>IIPA has been raising its internal resources through a large number of training and research projects and the 30% funding for the Sevent Pay Commission has been done through enhanced internal income training and research.</p> <p>IIPA has been requesting the Government to enhance the Grants to IIPA so that the liability can be reduced. However, the Government is not very inclined for the same.</p> <p>This problem is mainly due to the perceived depreciated value and the actual value of the assets. Due to Covid 19 pandemic, the normal activities has been crippled since February this year. However, the matter will be resolved soon.</p> <p>The NIDM is a Government Institution under Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India. IIPA has been writing to the NIDM and requesting them also to remit the amount to IIPA. However, they have not remitted the amount so far.</p>

IIPA has been managing the Salary and Pension disbursement in the year 2020-21 somehow but not been able to disburse some allowances also due to virtually hands to mouths situation. As such, if any faculty has been selected/appointed in some external Institution/Organisation on a higher position on deputation and not being able to join there due to existing lower position at IIPA, s/he may be considered for notional upgradation of his/her position, maximum by one level, subject to being eligible and without any financial implication on IIPA. Also, s/he shall be required to provide an undertaking that s/he shall join on the earlier substantive position as and when s/he would rejoin IIPA.

(vii) Admission of Associate and Student Members.

IIPA received applications for Associate and Student membership from Regional and Local Branches and also directly from the applicants. The 76 applications for Associate membership and 26 applications for Student membership are submitted for approval of the Executive Council. The list of applications is annexed as Annexure H and I.

Item No.313.2 (a) Confirmation of the Minutes of 312th meeting of the Executive Council held on 30th August, 2019.

The minutes as circulated, were confirmed.

(b) Action taken on the minutes referred to above.

Director informed that a Disciplinary Committee, which was approved to be formed in the meeting of Executive Council of 30 August 2019, has been constituted with the approval of the Chairman under the Chairmanship of the Director consisting of Prof. K.K. Pandey, Prof. C. Sheela Reddy and Registrar.

Director also informed that as decided in the previous E.C. meeting of 30th August 2019, for seeking voluntary contribution from members of IIPA, IIPA has received very good response in this regard and till date 39 members contributed Rs 1.20 Lakhs. E.C. appreciated and thanked the members of IIPA who contributed for the cause.

Regarding the Branches meeting, the attendance of Chairmen of the Branches was discussed. During discussions on Essay Competition, Chairman informed that the objective of the holding essay competition was to encourage young scholars and students to participate. The prize money was also enhanced but there was not so good response from the young

people. The regional and local branches need to work in this direction and inspire the young scholars to participate.

Shri S.C. Misra, Chairman, Odisha Regional Branch said that the active membership in every branches has gone down and new members are not being admitted. If new members are admitted than more people will be encouraged to participate in various competitions and activities of IIPA and branches. Chairman informed that due to legal matters, the life membership has been stopped for now. But IIPA is conferring Associate Members to those who are applying. He also informed that these essay competitions are not limited to members only but open to all. Director added that after the resolve of the legal matters, the Associate Members may be converted to Life Members if they request for the same and fulfill the eligibility conditions but the process will be as per the rules of the Institute and shall not be automatic. Director also added that the Associate Members enjoy the rights to access the library of the institute and participate in programmes of IIPA but not entitled to subsidized rates in the hostel.

Item No.313.7 Award for Excellence in Public Services.

The Executive Council approved the award for Excellence in Public Services to Vikas Bharti Bishunpur Dist. Gumla, Jharkhand, a voluntary social organisation to be conferred in the AGM of 2019. Chairman informed that we have received good number of nominations for this award and this organization from Jharkhand was selected by the Committee as they are doing commendable job in the backward areas for the development of the marginalized section. Director briefed the EC about the organization and activities of Vikas Bharti Bishunpur.

The organization would be presented a cash award of Rs.1,00,000/-, a plaque and a citation. As per the E.C. decision of October 15, 2015, IIPA will contribute Rs.50,000/- only for the award and the rest Rs.50,000/- and other expenditures will be borne by the IIPA Alumni Association.

Item No.313.8 A brief report on the important activities of the Institute during September-October, 2019 relating to Training Programmes and Status of Research Projects.

Noted.

Shri S.S. Kshatriya, Chairman, Maharashtra Regional Branch said that in the list of training programme, IIPA conducted training of the newly inducted Joint Secretaries to Government of India from the private sector and Shri Kashtriya wanted to know about the experience of IIPA while imparting training to them. Director replied that it was a wonderful experience. IIPA trained the 08 participants recruited by the Government. The participants had vast experience in their respective fields of aerospace, IT, energy and environment and climate change etc. Director also informed the EC that IIPA has got the privilege to sign the MoU with International Solar Alliance (ISA) on 21 October 2019. The first half of the programme will held at the residence of Hon. Vice President of India and the second half will be held at IIPA. The IIPA-ISA alliance is likely to conduct around 100 training programmes.

The International Solar Alliance is headquartered in India (Gurgram) and Director added that it is on the focus and priority of Hon. Prime Minister of India, Shri Narendra Modi ji.

Shri Shekhar Dutt, Vice President said that now a days, bright pass-outs from IIT, IIMs are not opting for jobs in Government or Corporate sector. They are more inclined to start their own ventures or join professional development non-governmental organizations. IIPA should try to reach out these bright pass-outs and provide appropriate training to them. In Israel, every day hundreds of start-ups are established and Government is encouraging them. In India, MSME Development Institute (MSME-DI), Okhla is working to train the young professionals for start-ups. So, IIPA should also work in this direction. Chairman said that it is good idea but it will be difficult for IIPA to identify those bright pass-outs and train them. The Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises through their training institutes are more equipped to provide this training.

In regard to MSME, Prof. K.K. Pandey informed the EC that IIPA is working with MSME and MSME-DI for the formulation of first MSME policy of India. The Ministry has bestowed this task to IIPA. The EC members appreciated this achievement of IIPA. Director added that regional and local branches can play a great role in formulation of National MSME Policy by IIPA.

Item No.313.9 Revised Budget Estimates for 2019-20 and Budget Estimates for 2020-21.

While discussing the financials of IIPA, Chairman informed that IIPA tried to get more funds from DoPT and Finance Ministry earlier but didn't get favorable response due to various issues. But IIPA is working towards generation of more revenue through its training and research work. Shri Shekhar Dutt, Vice President added that there are scope to earn more from training programme as the Government is putting special focus on training and capacity building. Director informed that now a days training and research work are mainly acquired through bidding process and there is tough competition among different institutions. The policy of the Government is that all the training institutes should become self-sufficient. Director briefed that there are 353 national level training institutes working under 56 different Ministries of Government of India but imparting training to less than 1% of the employees. Many cadres of Central Civil Services do not have even the foundation courses. The Government is seriously working towards associating knowledge partners from outside and NILARD (under NITI Aayog) has initiated such process reportedly. As such, we have to work hard and seriously to stay relevant.

The Director further added that there are two dozen services which have no provision of organized Foundation Training Programme. Training is periodically imparted to only All India Service (AIS) officers and few Central Civil Services. Shri Shekhar Dutt, Vice President said that there is need to give more emphasis on the training and capacity building of the Government officials. India need to learn from Singapore in this regard, where Government officials are trained in best institutions of the world like Harvard University, Stanford University etc. Chairman said that NITI Aayog needs to take a call in this regard and should advice the Government to make more emphasis on training and capacity building. Shri Neeraj Singhal, Director - Representing C.E.O., NITI Aayog said that the Aayog is preparing Vision Document for India and he will place these suggestions of E.C. to the Aayog.

The Chairman informed that the Institute is organizing faculty conclave on 09 November 2019 and on 10 November 2019, the faculty will give presentations before a committee of IIPA. Chairman advised that the CEO of NITI Aayog should be invited on 10 November 2019 in the valedictory session. Director said that the CEO will be invited for the occasion.

Shri S.C. Misra enquired about the long term liability of IIPA. The Director informed that the long term liability consisted of the retirement benefits like pension, gratuity, leave encashment etc. of the employees of IIPA. Shri S.S. Kshatriya enquired whether Government can be requested for a one time grant to settle this. The Director informed that the Government is not likely entertain this. Shri Kshatriya informed the E.C. about the revival of YASHADA, Pune, the State training academy of Maharashtra. He informed that it was fully dependent on Government earlier but the Government told it to be self sufficient. Now YASHADA is fully self sufficient. IIPA can study the revival model of YASHADA and learn something out of it.

With these observations, the Executive Council approved the Revised Budget Estimates for 2019-20 and Budget Estimates for 2020-21.

Item No.313.10 Audit Fee for 2019-20 to be paid to the Auditors to be appointed at the Annual General Body Meeting to be held on 18th October, 2019.

The Executive Council approved that the proposal for continuance of the existing Auditor M/s GSA & Associates for 2019-20 on payment of audit fee of Rs.1,20,000/- (for all accounts of the Institute) plus tax as applicable be placed for the approval of the General Body in its ensuing meeting to be held on 18th October 2019.

Item No.313.11 Resolutions received from members for consideration at the Annual General Body Meeting.

Director informed that we have received resolution from Shri P.L. Banga which has been circulated to the Executive Council. Director further conveyed that this Hon'ble Member keeps on sending RTIs, letters etc. sometimes in the name of P.L. Banga, sometimes in the name of P. Lal and sometimes in the name of P. Lall, just raising flimsy queries regarding reducing hostel rates, changing mess contractor, penalizing the CPIO etc. The Chairman replied that he is one of those persons who are habitual trouble makers raising trivial issues without any substance.

Item No.313.12 Items to Report:

(i) Appointment/joining.

Ratified.

(ii) Resignation of Dr. Anupam Sarkar, Assistant Professor of Applied Economics.

Noted. The Chairman advised to recruit some good quality faculty at IIPA. The Director conveyed that it will be processed and we will recruit some good quality faculty on contract basis shortly.

At the end of the meeting, Director explained the status of the campus re-development plan of IIPA which was desired to be informed by Prof. Lokendra Singh, Chairman of Manipur Regional Branch. Director informed that NBCC will implement the project and initially NBCC estimated that Rs.450 crore will be the expenditure and this amount will be recovered through leasing the buildings constructed on unused portion of land for 30 years. But as per the current situation of the market, the NBCC is now of the view that the amount will be recovered in around 50-60 years. Presently, NBCC has no CMD and soon the new CMD will join. Director informed that he will take-up this matter with the new CMD of NBCC. Director also informed that for this re-development project, various approvals from different Government departments and offices are required and IIPA is working towards getting these approvals.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

Item No.314.2 Election of the Chairman of the Institute under Rule 9 of the Rules of the Institute.

Shri T.N. Chaturvedi thanked all the E.C. members, the Institute and every one for reposing faith in him as Chairman, IIPA. He conveyed that many a time the thought of leaving the position of Chairman came to his mind but he did not leave as he did not want to leave IIPA in lurch. There are legal matters pending as also the DoPT Committee report is pending with the Government. However, all the members persuaded Shri T.N. Chaturvedi to continue as Chairman, IIPA. Prof. K.K. Pandey proposed the name of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi for Chairmanship. Shri Shekhar Dutt, Shri S.S. Kshatriya and Prof. N. Lokendra Singh seconded the name of Shri T.N. Chaturvedi for Chairmanship.
